

WHAT IS IT?

- **Legionella** are bacteria found in natural and human-made water sources
- They can cause two types of infections, known as legionellosis:
 - Legionnaires' disease: A serious form of pneumonia
 - Pontiac fever: A milder, flu-like illness without pneumonia

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Legionnaires' Disease (Severe form)

- Fever (often high)
- Cough (dry or productive), shortness of breath, chest pain
- Muscle aches, fatigue, headache
- Diarrhea, nausea or vomiting
- Confusion or disorientation

Pontiac Fever (Mild form)

- Fever, muscle aches, headache, fatigue
- No cough or pneumonia



- Legionella can grow in poorly maintained water systems in homes and buildings
- Common sources include:
 - Cooling towers
 - HVAC systems (heating, ventilation, air conditioning)
 - Showers and hot & cold water tanks

Who's Most at Risk?

- Adults over 50
- Smokers
- People with chronic lung disease
- Immunocompromised individuals
- People with diabetes, kidney disease, or cancer

TRANSMISSION

How Legionella Spreads:

 By breathing in tiny water droplets (mist) that contain the bacteria

Not Spread by:

- Person-to-person contact (extremely rare)
- Drinking contaminated water

IPAC CONSIDERATIONS

- Keep water hot or cold: Hot water >50°C, cold <20°C
- Prevent stagnation: Keep water flowing; flush unused outlets
- Clean regularly: Disinfect tanks, pipes, showers, cooling systems
- Test water, specially in high-risk buildings
- Train staff on risks, cleaning, response steps
